Citi Postsecondary Success Program

The Problem: In the United States, only 34% of students nationally leave high school prepared for success in college. The likelihood of success is even more limited for low-income and first-generation students. Although these students aspire to go to college, several factors align to their disadvantage: inadequate academic preparation and access to college information and financial aid options, and lack of alignment and coordination among college access programs that aim to serve them.

A Place-Based, Cross-Sector Solution: The focus of the Citi Postsecondary Success Program (CPSP), a five-year initiative (2008-2013) also supported by local matching funds, is to improve postsecondary access and success for low-income and first-generation students in three major cities—Miami, San Francisco, and Philadelphia. CPSP's main strategy is to build local partnerships in each of these cities that will coordinate the provision of college access and success supports and, importantly, seek system-level changes to support and sustain their efforts.

The CPSP initiative is structured as a partnership between **FHI 360** and the **Public Education Network (PEN)**; these two organizations serve as intermediaries for the initiative, provide technical assistance to the sites, oversee the evaluation being conducted by **OMG Center for Collaborative Learning**, and disseminate findings to the field. To implement the work locally, CPSP is partnering with the **Local Education Funds (LEF)** in Miami, Philadelphia, and San Francisco, believing that—as independent community-based public education reform organizations—LEFs are well positioned to lead the **collective impact** work of the local partnerships.

CPSP Key Goals:

- Build sustainable CPSP partnerships to improve college access and success programs and supports. CPSP brings
 together the cross-sector organizations addressing college access and success issues including, direct service providers, K-12
 and postsecondary stakeholders, and representatives from the business, funding, and civic sectors, to better coordinate their
 work to address the multiple obstacles to college access and retention facing underserved students.
- Increase student access to and success in postsecondary education. CPSP is NOT about creating new programs, but rather about improving coordination of what already exists. Improving the alignment and quality of existing services will increase student use of college access and success supports that will in turn lead to increased college readiness, application, and acceptance.
- Enhance the post-secondary access and success field. CPSP is helping to create the *fundamental changes* that take schools and cities *from* the current patchwork of college programs *to* a coordinated system linking students to comprehensive services within a supportive policy environment. Disseminating lessons learned from CPSP will help increase the capacity of field to take on similar systems change efforts.

CPSP Interim Outcomes (after 3 years of implementation) include:

- High school graduation, college enrollment, and persistence rates for the 10 CPSP target high schools are trending in the positive direction (compared against comparison schools and the district as a whole, according to quantitative data analyzed by OMG).
- In addition, two of the cities are succeeding specifically with Latino, Black & English Language Learners—in Miami, college
 enrollment rose sharply over the course of three years in the CPSP target schools on average outpacing comparison
 schools. In San Francisco, Black students' college enrollment exceeded district and comparison school rates. Latino
 students enjoyed modest five percentage point increase to 41% outpacing district college enrollment trends.
